

## Pastoral Care

We are proud of the outstanding pastoral care that we provide. Our pupils' wellbeing is at the heart of our school. Our Pastoral Team, led by our Vice-Principal, Ms. Clarke, strives to ensure our students feel safe, nurtured and happy because it is only then that they can truly realise their potential.

*Our Pastoral Team includes:*

### Class Tutors

Every student meets with their Class Tutor twice a day. Class Tutors play a pivotal role in every student's life at St. Patrick's Academy as they are responsible for their pastoral care and monitor their academic progress. Students can discuss any concern with their Tutor and parents/carers can contact them throughout the year.

### Year Heads

Each of our six Year Heads has overall responsibility for a specific year group. They work closely with their Class Tutors to ensure pupils are supported pastorally and academically. They also work with outside agencies; they are all members of the Pastoral Council, and they work with the Vice-Principal and Principal on student wellbeing and pastoral matters.

### The Head of Key Stage

The Head of Key Stage is the Senior Leader responsible for all students within a particular Key Stage in the school. Key Stage 3 (Y8-Y10), Key Stage 4 (Y11-Y12) and Key Stage 5 (Y13-Y14).

### The Vice-Principal

Ms. Clarke is our Vice-Principal, and she has overall responsibility for our Pastoral Care and Safeguarding provision. Ms. Clarke oversees our Pastoral Care and wellbeing programme. As Designated Teacher for Child Protection, she leads the Safeguarding team as well as the development of our preventative curriculum to ensure pupils feel safe, happy and supported throughout their educational journey at St. Patrick's Academy. She is also responsible for supporting Year Heads and staff with additional pastoral matters.

### Mrs Devlin - Head of Year 8

Mrs Devlin's role is to ensure the welfare of the Year 8 students. She works closely with our very special Yr8 Class Tutors to guide the academic, social and emotional progress of all the pupils within her year group.

## Peer Mentors

Our Peer Mentoring Programme is based on our Post 16 students offering guidance and support to younger pupils. The mentors draw upon their experiences to help younger students through any challenges they may experience. They play a vital role in school life.

## School Council

## Our Unique Year 8 Transition Programme

Here at St. Patrick's Academy, we pride ourselves on our unique Year 8 Transition Programme. We have a dedicated Year 8 Block where Year 8 pupils spend a significant part of their day with their Class Tutor who is also their base teacher. Their base teacher delivers a number of subjects, and this allows for meaningful relationships to be built academically and pastorally. We have found that this level of nurture and support helps students make a smoother transition from primary to post-primary education.

In the past we have hosted visits from other post-primary schools eager to follow our transition programme having realised the many benefits it offers to our students.

## Key Stage 5 Curriculum (Years 13&14)

All pupils study a minimum of three A level subjects during their Sixth form years. These A levels can be a mix of "General" or "Applied" subjects and lead on to third level education.

The Academy is part of the Lisburn Area Learning Community, therefore pupils may opt to study a range of up to 27 different subjects offered in our home school or in collaboration with all other Lisburn schools.



# A Successful School

## OUR PROUD TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE IN PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS

We take great pride in our students' performance in public examinations and are proud of their achievements in so many subjects this year. St. Patrick's has a proud tradition of excellence in GCSE English in which 82% of our students achieved grades A\*- C. This is significantly above the NI average and a testament to the strong importance we place on literacy within the school.

GCSE Maths also performed well above the NI average with 71% of all students achieving grades A\*- C. Performance in GCSE Maths continues to increase every year and, with this, has come the opportunity for some students to complete GCSE Further Maths which has a current success rate of 100% A\*- C grades.

Student performance in GCSE Science also remains consistently high with 90% of our students achieving GCSE grades A\*A\*- CC in Double Award Science and 76% of all students achieving A\*- C in Single Award Science. Again, these results plot above the NI average performance for GCSE Science in similar schools.

Our student performance in the Creative Arts was also extremely strong this year with 100% A\*- C grades in GCSE Music and 79% A\*- C grades in Art and Design.

Our students also performed exceptionally in Applied GCSE and Equivalent Courses with 100% L2 pass grades (GCSE grade C equivalent) in Occupational Studies Business Services, Occupational Studies Design and Creativity, Occupational Studies Engineering and 100% L2 pass grades (GCSE grade C equivalent) in OCN NI Personal Success and Wellbeing, OCNNI Religious Studies and OCN NI ICT. BTEC Travel and Tourism students also achieved 100% A\*- C GCSE equivalent grades.



Our KS5 students achieved excellent success in A level Health & Social Care where 100% of students achieved A\*- C grades. This is, once again, significantly above the NI average grade performance for this subject. Students also achieved 100% A\*- C in A level History and BTEC Applied Law and 90% of students achieved A\*- C grades in our popular L2 BTEC Sport qualification.

Our students' success at both GCSE and A level demonstrate the strong commitment of staff and students to realising potential and grounding success aspirations in reality by setting high expectations, cultivating a strong work ethic and fostering confidence and self-belief. This passion for learning has led to a significantly higher uptake of Post 16 places and a number of our Y14 students progressing to undergraduate study at a range of universities.



# A Proud School

We take every opportunity to celebrate the many talents and achievements of our students. We believe it is imperative to publicly acknowledge all that our students do. We have a very lively social media account where we consistently highlight our students using their talents and skills. We celebrate their sporting prowess, their charitable endeavours, their successes in the Arts and many other fields.

We also host Junior and Senior Prize Days throughout the year when we invite family and friends to join in with our celebrations. Prize Days are really important opportunities to highlight all the diligence and passion that our students possess. # An Inclusive School



St. Patrick's Academy is an inclusive school, welcoming students of different faiths and ethnicities. We celebrate the cultural diversity within our school on a daily basis and with dedicated events throughout the year.

We also have four Specialist Provision in Mainstream Schools groups to meet the additional needs of some of our students. These groups are an integral part of our school as highly trained staff and outside professionals provide a variety of support to ensure a successful learning experience for SEN students. We offer a differentiated curriculum at Key Stage 3 and a tailored curriculum at Key Stage 4 to ensure students with additional needs are offered appropriate pathways to prepare them for life beyond St. Patrick's Academy. We work closely with Southern Eastern Regional College to offer practical and enjoyable courses in conjunction with a Pathway Programme within school to ensure students realise their full potential.

# A School Working in Partnership

As Catholic educators, we know that a child's parents are the first, and best, teachers. We, as a school, strive to maintain close links with home. We will work in partnership with parents and pupils to ensure all pupils achieve their full potential. Parents can contact the school to speak with teachers or to make an appointment to meet with a Class Tutor, Year Head, Head of Key Stage, the Vice-Principal or Principal. Tracking reports are sent three times per year. In addition, parents from each year group are invited to Parent Information Sessions, Parents' Evenings and other events throughout the busy year.



## Communication

### SIMS Parent App

Here at St. Patrick's, our primary means of communication is through SIMS Parent App. This is a really user-friendly and instantly accessible app. You can access this through a smart phone, a PC or a tablet. You will find the following information on the app:

## SPiMS

At St. Patrick's Academy we celebrate inclusion and diversity. Our school population reflects the rich tapestry of society. We have worked closely with the Education Authority to establish four SPiMs.

### What does SPiM stand for?

SPiM stands for '**Specialist Provision in Mainstream Schools**' (SPiM). These specialist provisions provide a modified learning environment with an enhanced pupil/teacher ratio suited to the pupil's learning profiles. Pupils also have the opportunity to experience social interaction and curricular activities alongside their peers.

Every SPiMs room is uniquely designed to best meet the needs of the pupils and are inspired by guidance from EA advisors. We welcome pupils of all ability and endeavour to meet their needs to the very best of our ability, realising each child is unique and gifted.



## Student Council

Our student council is an extremely important part of school life at St Patrick's. It involves all year groups from Year 8 – Year 14 (including Head Boy/Girl and Deputies). Each class will have at least one representative to put forward the student voice. We have an amazing team of pupils who are keen to get involved in important school issues. In previous years our pupils were involved in:

- Clean-up of the school yard (regular litter picks)
- Homework Diary Competition – each year a student will win the competition for a new design of the front cover of the school homework diary
- Achieving the prestigious "Schools Eco Flag Award"
- Clean up and maintenance of the school garden area (weeding, cleaning, and planting)
- Developing the 'Working Better Together Policy'
- Campaigning for the bike shelter and new water fountain in conjunction with the PTA

This year, the main aim of our action plan will be to continue to become more eco-friendly as a school community. The student council aims are to try to reduce waste and recycle more! We are also hoping to link in with the PTA with any fundraising campaigns.

## PTA

St. Patrick's Academy Parent Teacher Association was formally constituted in February 2023. It has been instrumental in supporting both the work of the school and the needs of the students. The PTA actively listens to the student voice and has successfully raised money for an additional student water fountain and a sheltered bike rack. It is also assisting those students involved in the ECO flag award through the organisation of a tree planting event to improve the school environment, and a 'Cash for Clobber' event which encourages the entire school community to recycle their old clothes.

The PTA is committed to developing the entire school community and it sponsors the attendance awards for students and the Community Award at the school's annual Prize Day.

# Admissions criteria for entry September 2026

In the event of over-subscription the Board of Governors delegates to the Principal and either the Chairman, Vice Chairman or Secretary, the function of applying the admissions criteria in the order set down 1-7.

## Admissions Criteria – Year 8

1. Pupils who are members of the Parishes of Blaris, Glenavy & Killead, Derriagh, Hannastown or Kilwarlin.
2. Pupils transferring from the primary schools in the Parishes listed in 1 above who are not members of those Parishes.
3. Pupils who have a brother or sister enrolled in St Patrick's (must be indicated on the Transfer Application).
4. Pupils who are from the parishes of Lagmore and Poleglass.
5. Pupils who are the eldest child or only child in their family (must be indicated on the Transfer Application).
6. Other pupils who are members of other Parishes.
7. Pupils whose Transfer Application expresses Saint Patrick's as their 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, etc. (non-grammar) preference (taken in that order).

Should there be over-subscription amongst applicants, once the above criteria have been applied, selection for all places remaining will be on the basis of a computer-based process which will make use of the names as entered on the online application. The process is carried out by means of a computer programme which, for each applicant, generates a ranking number using the details from the online application as the seed for a random number generator. The outcome, for any given applicant, is dependent only on the applicant's name (as entered on the online application) and is not affected by the details of any other applicant. Although the process is repeatable, and the results may therefore be subsequently verified, it is not possible to predict, in advance of running the programme, what the result will be for any given series.

During the admissions procedure when applying the criteria punctual applications will be considered before late applications are considered. The application procedure opens on 27th January 2026 at 12 noon (GMT) and an application submitted by the closing date of 19th February 2026 at 12 noon (GMT) will be treated as a punctual application. ## Waiting List Policy

The criteria relating to the initial admission of pupils into year 8 before the commencement of the 2025 school year will also be used for entry in Year 8 should admission become possible after the commencement of the 2025 school year to all previously unsuccessful applicants and to those who now wish to be on our waiting list.
